"Jazz and Djaz: Exploring Cultural Flows through Haitian Improvised Music"
Early 20th-century jazz has been described as having a "Latin tinge"--a term that complicates perceptions and definitions of what some have presumed to be a uniquely North American cultural product. But despite this admirable nod to the stylistic influence of Cuban and other Latin American musics, the distinctly Haitian musical contributions to the art form labeled "jazz" are often under appreciated. In this paper, I explore North American jazz and Haitian "djaz" as fluid zones of cultural practice, the meanings of which transcend conventional categorizations and shape inspired musical performances in twenty-first century Haiti and its diaspora. Melvin L. Butler is a saxophonist and ethnomusicologist with broad interests in popular music and religion of the African diaspora. He is the author of Island Gospel: Pentecostal Music and Identity in Jamaica and the United States (Univ. of Illinois Press, 2019).
